Haunts

'TIS the season for haunting entertainments. Radio stations KOIL and WOW will open their haunted houses this weekend, running through Halloween.

KOIL has two houses this year. One in the Oak Hills Shopping Center, 127th and Q Streets, is cosponsored by the Millard Jaycees, with proceeds going to community projects.

The other at 219th and Pacific Streets is cosponsored by the West Omaha Sertoma Club, with proceeds for hearing programs, and by Campus Life.
